This interim financial report covers the Solaris Australian Equity Long Short Fund as an individual entity.

The Responsible Entity of the Solaris Australian Equity Long Short Fund is Pinnacle Fund Services Limited (ABN 29 082 494 362). The Responsible Entity's registered office is Level 19, 307 Queen Street, Brisbane, QLD, 4000.

Directors' report

The directors of Pinnacle Fund Services Limited, the responsible entity ("Responsible Entity") of the Solaris Australian Equity Long Short Fund ("the Fund"), present their report together with the interim financial statements of the Fund for the half-year ended 31 December 2019.

Principal activities

The Fund is a registered managed investment fund domiciled in Australia.

The Fund provides the investor with an opportunity to invest in a fundamental style neutral Australian equity long short product. The Fund will maintain a net exposure of 70% - 100%, with the proceeds from shorting (40% maximum) reinvested in preferred long positions in order to enhance returns. The investment objective of the Fund is to achieve returns that exceed the S&P/ASX200 Accumulation Index by taking both long and short positions in selected shares listed on a recognised Australian exchange. The portfolio will typically consist of 40 - 70 long ideas and 20 - 30 short ideas. The Fund may be suitable for investors with an investment horizon of 3 to 5 years, and seek capital growth and income via exposure to Australian stocks and are willing to accept the short-term fluctuations in price typically associated with such investments.

Solaris Investment Management Limited is the Investment Manager of the Fund.

The Fund did not have any employees during the half-year.

Notes to the interim financial statements

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1 Basis of preparation of interim financial statements

This interim report for the half-year ended 31 December 2019 has been prepared in accordance with the *Corporations Act 2001* and Australian Accounting Standard AASB 134 *Interim Financial Reporting*.

This interim report does not include all the notes of the type normally included in an annual financial report. Accordingly, this report is to be read in conjunction with the annual report for the year ended 30 June 2019 and any public announcements made in respect of the Solaris Australian Equity Long Short Fund ("the Fund") during the interim reporting period in accordance with the continuous disclosure requirements of the *Corporations Act 2001*.

The interim report was authorised for issue by the directors on 6 March 2020. The directors of Pinnacle Fund Services Limited ("the Responsible Entity") have the power to amend and reissue the interim report.

The accounting policies and methods of computation adopted in the preparation of the half-year financial report are consistent with those adopted and disclosed in the Fund's annual financial report for the year ended 30 June 2019. These accounting policies are consistent with Australian Accounting Standard and with International Financial Reporting Standards.

New accounting policies

The Fund has initially adopted AASB 9 *Financial Instruments* and AASB 15 *Revenue from Contracts with Customers* from 1 July 2018. There was no material effect of the adoption of these standards to the Fund.

AASB 9 Financial Instruments (and applicable amendments)

AASB 9 *Financial Instruments* addresses the classification, measurement and derecognition of financial assets and liabilities and replaces the multiple classification and measurement models in AASB 139. Classification and measurement of debt securities is driven by the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets.

The Fund does not hold debt instruments that could result in reclassification of financial instruments to amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income. The derecognition rules have not changed from the previous and the Fund does not apply hedge accounting.

AASB 9 has been applied retrospectively by the Fund without the use of hindsight and it has determined that adoption did not result in a change to the classification or measurement of financial instruments in either the current or comparative period. The Fund's investment portfolio continues to be classified as 'fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)' and other financial assets which are held for collection continue to be measured at amortised cost. There was no material impact on adoption from the application of the new impairment model.

The adoption of AASB 9 introduces a new expected credit loss (ECL) impairment model. However, as the Fund's investments are all at FVTPL, the change in impairment rules will not impact the Fund.

AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers

The AASB 15 has issued a new standard for the recognition of revenue. This replaces AASB 118 which covers contracts for goods and services and AASB 111 which covers construction contracts. The new standard is based on the principle that revenue is recognised when control of a good or service transfers to a customer thus replacing the existing notion of risks and rewards.

The Fund's main sources of income are interest, dividends and gains on financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss. All of these are outside the scope of the new revenue standard. As a consequence, there has been no material impact on the Fund's revenue recognition nor on the accounting policies and financial statements.

1 Basis of preparation of interim financial statements (continued)

There are no other standards that are not yet effective and that are expected to have a material impact on the Fund in the prior periods or will affect the current or future reporting periods and on foreseeable future transactions.

6 Fair value measurements

The Fund measures and recognises the below financial assets and liabilities held at fair value through profit or loss on a recurring basis.

Fair value hierarchy

Classification of financial assets and financial liabilities

The Fund classifies fair value measurements using a fair value hierarchy that reflects the subjectivity of the inputs used in making the measurements. The fair value hierarchy has the following levels:

- Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1)
- Inputs other than quoted prices included within level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices) (level 2)
- Inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (that is, unobservable inputs) (level 3).

(i) Fair value in an active market (level 1)

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities traded in active markets is based on their quoted market prices at the end of the reporting period without any deduction for estimated future selling costs.

The Fund values its investments in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 2. For the majority of its investments, the Fund relies on information provided by independent pricing services for the valuation of its investments.

The quoted market price used for financial assets held by the Fund is the last traded price; the appropriate quoted market price for financial liabilities is the last traded price. When the Fund holds derivatives with offsetting market risks, it uses mid-market prices as a basis for establishing fair values for the offsetting risk positions and applies this bid or asking price to the net open position, as appropriate.

A financial instrument is regarded as quoted in an active market if quoted prices are readily and regularly available from an exchange, dealer, broker, industry group, pricing service, or regulatory agency, and those prices represent actual and regularly occurring market transactions on an arm's length basis.

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market is determined using valuation techniques. These include the use of recent arm's length market transactions, reference to the current fair value of a substantially similar other instrument, discounted cash flow techniques or any other valuation technique that provides a reliable estimate of prices obtained in actual market transactions.

Where discounted cash flow techniques are used, estimated future cash flows are based on management's best estimates and the discount rate used is a market rate at the end of the reporting period applicable for an instrument with similar terms and conditions.

For other valuation techniques, inputs are based on market data at the end of the reporting period. Fair values for unquoted equity investments are estimated, if possible, using applicable price/earnings ratios for similar listed companies adjusted to reflect the specific circumstances of the issuer.

The fair value of derivatives that are not exchange traded is estimated at the amount that the Fund would receive or pay to terminate the contract at the end of reporting period taking into account current market conditions (volatility and appropriate yield curve) and the current creditworthiness of the counterparties. The foreign currency contracts are valued at the forward rate.

Investments in other unlisted unit trusts are recorded at the redemption value per unit as reported by the investment managers of such trusts.

Some of the inputs to these models may not be market observable and are therefore estimated based on assumptions.

Valuation techniques employed may not fully reflect all factors relevant to the positions the Fund holds. Valuations are therefore adjusted, where appropriate, to allow for additional factors including liquidity risk and counterparty risk.

The carrying value less impairment provision of other receivables and payables are assumed to approximate their fair values. The fair value of financial liabilities for disclosure purposes is estimated by discounting the future contractual cash flows at the current market interest rate that is available to the Fund for similar financial instruments.
